Jeremiah Lyons, one the oldest and most respected citizens of Lake county died last night at his home in Badus, aged 74 years. Mr. Lyons has been a sufferer for about a year and a half from an internal tumor and his end has been expected for some time. He was a native of Ireland, came to this country in 1840 and lived in Chicago until 1868 when he moved to Cresco, Iowa. Thence he came to Lake county about seven years ago and engaged in farming with his son William. Two years ago his wife died and there survives him three sons and five daughters, two of whom live in this county, two in Miner county and the others in Iowa and Chicago. One of the sons, Richard, of Carthage, arrived to-day. The funeral services will take place Sunday at 1 o'clock p. m. from the family residence and at 2:30 p. m. in the Badus church, Rev. Father Flynn, officiating. Most of the relatives from abroad are expected here in time for the funeral.
